



Brittany will provide guidance, support and resources to individuals and families in need under the supervision of the Senior Center Director, Bernadette Derring. She will be the point of contact for Mobile Foodshare, perform assessments, developing treatment plans, and case management services such as energy assistance, SNAP benefits, cash assistance, renters rebates and more.

Brittany will be also be the voice you hear when calling in to schedule your rides with the Columbia Transportation Program.

One of her first big projects will be The Columbia Food Pantry. It is currently being upgraded with a wide variety of necessities. Everything from perishable and non perishable items to personal care products like diapers, soaps, toothpaste, deodorant and more.

Brittany's core hours will be Monday—Friday 8am-3pm with extended hours on Mondays and Thursdays to assist residents that are working during business hours. TRANSPORTATION



The Town of Columbia's Senior Transportation Services provides transportation for residents who are sixty years and older or disabled adults eighteen years and older. The van has accommodations for two wheelchairs, and a maximum of 14 riders. A town-owned SUV allows for up to three people.

Transportation is provided for doctor appointments, shopping, wellness trips, banking, or various errands. Service is offered to and from the Beckish Senior Center for lunch or activities at the center. The hour of operation is Monday through Friday 8am to 3pm, excluding town holidays and inclement weather. Please call the Senior Center at 860-228-0759, extension 2, to speak with Flo or Brittney to schedule your ride. Rides should be made at least forty eight hours in advance. Medical rides should be made as soon as possible, these rides take precedent over all other rides.

Passengers must always wear a seatbelt. Food and drink are not allowed in the vehicle.

On a cold misty rainy mid-afternoon in early June, my wife received a call from two neighbors. They said she and a friend were out walking and spotted a small baby fawn lying down in the tall grass near the curb across the street from our house. They were concerned it or her mother might get hit by a car since we lived near the bottom of a hill and the cars go by pretty fast. They asked if we had any suggestions as to what to do. My wife asked me if I might help and I quickly put on a light jacket and went out to talk to them.

Our two neighbors were waiting at the side of the road about 100 feet from the fawn, warning approaching cars to go slow. They directed me by hand signals as to where the fawn was located and I immediately found it about 2 feet from the curb near our mailbox in the tall grass and overgrown weeds. It was lying motionless with its beautiful dark eyes fully open and did not move when I approached. It was a small female fawn. I knew she, as well as her mother, were in trouble, being in such a precarious location so near the road. I would have to move her. I put my arms under her body and picked her up. She offered no resistance. I carried her into our hayfield and gently laid her down in the wet tall hay and watched. She did not move so I assumed she was okay and walked back to the house.

After a few hours I thought I heard a faint sound coming from the woods. The fawn heard it too and ran into the woods crying out with her loud bleating sounds. "Thank Heavens" I thought, our problem is solved.

The next morning our daughter who lives next door, came over early in the morning before going to work. She said there was a fawn walking all over the hayfield crying. She got a small cat crate, walked over to the fawn who offered no resistance or showed any fear, and put her in the crate.

I took the crate and put it in the basement to keep her dry and protected as it was raining pretty hard.

She slept all night and then I put her into the field again. At first, she was OK but then began running around bleating and calling for her mother. My wife tried to get help from the town dog warden, our veterinarian, and state police. None were able to help. I then looked up information on abandoned deers on the Internet (State of CT Dept. of Energy and Environmental Protection) and found lots of information dealing with abandoned, distressed deer. They listed three people who were authorized to handle and care for deer. Two were in Salem and one in Weston.

I tried to be patient, hoping her mother would come but —no such luck. After lunch when she quieted down, I decided to take her to the Salem rehabilitator. I went into the bedroom to get my wallet and keys and glanced out the bedroom window. I could hardly believe what I saw. It was a large beautiful doe at the edge of the woods going into the hay field. Was this the fawns mother? How could I be so lucky?

I got my digital video camera, quietly opened the window and started taking pictures. The mother (I assumed) walked cautiously through the field, moving her head from side to side, smelling for the scent of her baby fawn in the hay. I was mesmerized watching her slow steady movement towards her baby which she could not see as the hay was too tall. The reunion was heartwarming as her nose finally touched the baby lying in the hay and the fawn popped up out of the hay to greet her mother. The mom licked her for only a short time as the fawn was hungry and it ducked under her body to suckle her after her long ordeal. Then they both went happily into the woods.

Whenever I see them together eating apples from under my trees, I often think of them as an extension of my lovely family.

Some of us older people may worry that with all the technological advances nowadays that the young people of today might be missing something. There used to be many small farms across this country, and many people of my age will have memories of yester-year when someone in their family had a farm. Many may have lived near a farm. There was a huge spring water cistern, a big grain box, and a ladder to go up to the hay loft. At milking time the barn cats would swarm to get a warm bowl of milk poured out by Grandpa. The cats would hide their litters up in the hay loft, and they would routinely earn their keep by controlling the abundant field mouse population. But now there were no cows in a barnyard or grazing in the pasture.

As we slowly drove by I could see that there was no barn left standing. Probably the foundation was still there behind and under the overgrown foliage. Perhaps the barn-wood had been salvaged for paneling in someone's new home years ago. And there was no field of hay to be cut, baled, lifted onto the hay wagon, and then put up in the barn. There was no rusty old farm truck to take filled milk cans into town for processing. There was no milk house, tool shed, chicken coup, smokehouse, or outhouse. I guess some of that's called progress.

The simple farmhouse I had visited as a child was no more. The woodshed which was at the back door and had held stacks of wood for the potbelly stove in the parlor was gone. It was the home where my caring Grandma had kept busy all day doing all the household duties and where Grandpa said grace at the table each mealtime. The house was now very different with major additions and it surely had modern renovations inside. The makeover was needed for today's living. After all...it was 70 years ago when I stayed there!

But alas, I have the memories of love and carefree childhood days on that farm of my Mom's parents. Those were delightful summer days of looking for kittens, naming the cows, and petting the old work horse in the barn. Those were days of taking turns with my cousin on the swing under the apple tree, and of us splashing in the creek that ran through a pasture. Hopefully today's children will have some great memories of their youth, even if very different from mine. I surely have wonderful and lasting memories of visiting the farm
